The deliberate killing of 6 million Jews Became dictator of Germany in 1933 & set up the new anti-Jewish order Hitler's party - National Socialist Germany Workers Party The types of people the Nazis wanted to get rid of: Jews, Gypsies, Gays, Disabled The deliberate destruction of a race or nation. Austria, France, Holland, Denmark, Germany Take on the culture around you. Live like those around you.
3	Depression Treaty of Versailles Mein Kampf Hitler's Top Brass Hitler Youth Heil Hitler SS/ Gestapo Aryan Anti-Semitism Zionism	An economic crisis. 'The Great Depression' started with 1929 stock market crash To end WWI, Germany had to agree some humiliating conditions in this treaty. Book Hitler wrote "My Struggle" in 1925; outlines many of his anti-Jewish ideas. Hitler's willing leaders. Eichmann is considered the architect of the Holocaust. Hitler forced all youth to become members where they learned to be good Nazis. The salute that was demanded of all. Hitler's elite combat troops/ Hitler's secret police force Hitler's made up race of blue-eyed, blonds as the Master Race. Hatred of Jews due to religious beliefs or acceptance of stereotyped ideas. To stop anti-Semitism, Jews must have a homeland of their own in Israel
4	Kristallnacht Scapegoat Judenrein Evian Conference	Nov. 9-10, 1938 -violent action against Jews, shattering stores and synagogues. Placing the blame on something/someone for someone else's wrongdoing. Making a place empty of Jews. The delegates didn't open doors to Jewish refugees. This made Hitler bolder.
5	Persecution Nuremberg Laws Propaganda Yellow Star Judenrein	Harassing, making things difficult for someone Racial laws making Jews non-citizens Biased information with a political slant. Jews were forced to identify themselves with a star sewn on to their clothing. Hitler's goal to make Europe "empty of Jews"
6	White Paper Deportation SS St. Louis Ghetto Judenrat Concentration camp Cattle Cars	British agreement limiting number of Jews that could immigrate to Palestine. Forcing someone to leave their home/country. Ship of Jewish refugees to Cuba that the US/Roosevelt refused to accept. A restricted part of the city meant to separate people, in this case Jews. Jewish council set up in the ghettos to make sure Nazi demands were followed. Prison/labor camps with terrible conditions that undesirables were sent to. Used to cram as many humans as possible to transport to concentration camps.

	Dehumanize	To take away basic rights and make people seem/feel less than human
7	Wannsee Final Solution Auschwitz Arbeit Macht Frei Selection Einsatzgruppen Kapo	Nazi conference to finalize the plans for the Final Solution, The Nazi plan of action to murder all the undesirables The most notorious of the death camps Work makes your free - the lie that formed the entrance to Auschwitz. Upon arrival to the camp, only the most fit were selected to live; the rest killed. Killing squad. The worst of massacre was at Babi Yar. A prisoner who performed administrative tasks in exchange for privileges.
8	Resistance Partisans Kindertransport Ghetto Uprising Righteous Gentiles White Rose Group Besa Forbidden Care	The act of defiance against something imposed on you. The people who resisted the Nazis from the forests A system that sent 10,000 kids to England for safety. Warsaw uprising was the largest single Jewish ghetto revolt against the Nazis . Non-Jews who helped Jews defy the Nazis in different ways. A group of German young people who distributed leaflets about the truth. The Albanian code of honor which prevented them from harming Jews. Prisoners who helped fellow prisoners despite the risk.
9	Liberation Allies vs. Axis Powers Dictators Pearl Harbor D-day Normandy VE Day	To make free US, England, Russia Vs. Germany, Japan, Italy Rulers with total power such as Hitler, Stalin of Russia, and Mussolini of Italy. 12/7/41 attack by Japanese air force on this US naval base brought US into WWII. 6/6/44 Allied troops landed on beaches of France - liberation began The French coast where 156,000 US troops landed on D-day to begin liberation. 5/8/45 Victory in Europe. Took a year from D-day to liberate all of Europe.
10	Refugee DP Camp Palestine Yalta Conference Hagana Ship	A person looking for a new country to live in because they had to flee their own. Most survivors ended up in a "Displaced Persons" camp, some for years. Before the State of Israel, the area was called Palestine. Where the new world leaders discussed how to reorganize Europe after the war. Ships Jewish defenders from Palestine used to smuggle Jewish refugees into Israel.
11	Nuremberg Trials Ferenz Trials Reparations Simon Wiesenthal	Trying to bring justice by bringing Nazis to trial Trials bringing Einsatzgruppen participants to trial Monetary compensation from Germany for those who lost everything in the war. Man who devoted his life to bringing Nazis to trial
12	Never Again Elie Wiesel Holocaust Denial Bystander Perpetrator Victim Upstander "Don't Stand Idly By"	Slogan of the Holocaust, that we will not let genocide happen again. Survivor who devoted his life to promoting tolerance. Died recently in 2016. Promoting the idea that it never happened, or was much less than facts show. A person who watches an incident and neither participates nor stops it. A person who commits harmful, illegal, immoral acts. A person against whom a harmful act is committed. A person who takes a stand when injustice occurs. Elie Wiesel applied this biblical quote to promote being an Upstander.
13	Eisenhower Terezin	US WWII general who made sure everything was photographed. Nazis used this as 'the model camp' - the art teacher was able to hide the children's art
14	Post-survivor era Testimonial Genealogy	Once all the survivors die out (soon), there will be no first hand witnesses. Recorded or written survivor interviews saved for the post-survivor era. The study of your family tree.
15	Memorial USHMM Yad Va'Shem Paper Clips	An art piece or ceremony to remember people who have died or a past event. United States Holocaust Memorial Museum Israel's Holocaust Memorial Museum (means 'hand and name') Whitehill Tennessee middle school project to understand the number 6 million.
16	Poland	Had the largest Jewish population prior to WWII, and nearly the smallest after.
17	Children	How did children survive?
18	Chai/Chaim	Hebrew term for "Alive" and also number 18/ Hebrew for Life (name of the museum)
